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Presidents Report

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...continues to make an outstanding contribution to conservation of biodiversity and natural places across Tasmania.



Dear friends

I have great pleasure in presenting the Tasmanian Land Conservancy's sixth Annual Report for 2006-2007.

As you will see from this report, the Tasmanian Land Conservancy continues to make an outstanding contribution to conservation of biodiversity and natural places across Tasmania. It has also been a year of important growth for the organisation and I am pleased with our progress towards building a strong organisation for our future conservation work.

Permanent TLC Reserves

Our permanent TLC reserve system was enhanced by the successful completion of the Recherche Bay fundraising campaign, fully securing the nationally significant 142ha forested property. The \$2.21 million purchase price of the reserve was raised with support from over 1000 individuals from across Australia and the Tasmanian Government. Dick and Pip Smith continued their outstanding support for the project by making an additional donation to write off their interest free Ioan. We also particularly recognise the role of Senator Bob Brown in initiating and supporting the establishment of this outstanding reserve.

A fifth reserve was added to TLC's permanent reserve system through a 455ha acquisition which extends the Chauncy Vale Wildlife Sanctuary in Tasmania's Southern Midlands. The Midlands area is one of Australia's most important regions for biodiversity and one of the least protected in reserves. The forested Flat Rock Reserve at Chauncy Vale is a significant addition to the protection of this important landscape. The land was previously owned by Gunns Ltd and the purchase was funded by both Gunns Ltd and the National Reserve System Programme.

We were also pleased to accept custodianship of the beautiful 80 ha Brown Mountain Reserve. The Brown Mountain Reserve was established by the Brown Mountain Trust through community donations in the 1990s and has been managed for conservation since. It will now be managed by TLC bringing our permanent reserves to six. Several more permanent TLC reserves are planned for the near future.

Partnerships for Conservation

Working with government has enhanced our conservation programmes with particular success in the Mole Creek Karst Forest Programme and Protected Areas on Private Land Programme. Six properties have been approved for purchase to protect forests and significant limestone cave systems in the Mole Creek area. Two of these properties will be covenanted and re-sold while four will be added to the nearby National Park.

The Protected Areas on Private Land Programme, which we operate with State Government and Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association has continued to work with enthusiastic landowners to create private protected areas as part of the National Reserve System. The TLC has now facilitated 2300ha in 43 protected areas through this programme. We have also expanded this programme to include a landscape scale conservation planning project for Tasmania's Midlands. Working with Bush Heritage Australia and other philanthropic partners we hope to make major contribution to this rich and most endangered of Tasmania's natural landscapes.

Revolving Fund

Our Revolving Fund activities have also continued and expanded. We have now agreed the sale of another property containing endangered King Island Blue Gum forest on King Island and are delighted that

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the Dorothy Reeves Reserve – now named Rubicon Sanctuary - has sold to owners who will be enthusiastic custodians of the critically endangered orchids on that site. The State Government's Department of Primary Industries and Water has recently provided extra support for TLC's revolving fund activities allowing another 80 ha property to be purchased.

The successes of the 2006-2007 year have been made possible by thousands of individuals and organisations. I thank the members and supporters of the Tasmanian Land Conservancy who have been extraordinarily generous and unwavering in their support of the organisation and particularly the outstanding support of Dick and Pip Smith. I also thank the members of the board who have given generously of their time and expertise and the staff of the organisation who continue to inspire all of us with their enthusiasm. I also specially thank the TLC's many funding partners including State and Commonwealth Governments who have funded many of the programmes that enhance our conservation work.

2007-2008 promises to be another year of outstanding conservation outcomes. I hope you will join me in continuing your support for the TLC's work.

Permanent Reserves

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These reserves will be retained by TLC and managed for conservation into the future.







1. Long Point Reserve Purchased 2005

This 386 ha reserve contains extensive areas of saltmarsh, coastal grassland and woodland within the internationally important Moulting Lagoon. The reserve protects habitat for migratory water birds and a number of threatened plant species.

2. Silver Peppermint Reserve Gifted 2005

This 43 ha reserve of vulnerable silver peppermint forest extends the Mount Bethune Conservation Area and provides habitat for numerous woodland birds.

3. Lutregala Marsh Reserve Purchased 2005

This 42 ha reserve of saltmarsh, grassland and woodland on Bruny Island protects habitat for the rare broad-striped ghost moth and endangered forty-spotted pardalote. The reserve extends the Bruny Island Neck Game Reserve.

4. Recherche Bay Reserve Purchased 2006

This 144 ha forested peninsula encloses the northern section of Recherche Bay. The reserve forms the core of the nationally important historic heritage site of Recherche Bay and contains Tasmania's first European garden, created by French explorers in 1792. The reserve contains old growth forest, an active nest of the vulnerable white-bellied sea eagle and foraging habitat for the threatened swift parrot and masked owl.

5. Flat Rock Reserve Purchased 2006

This 455 ha reserve of grassland and woodland connects the Chauncy Vale Wildlife Sanctuary with the Alpha Pinnacle Conservation Area. The reserve is within the Tasmanian Midlands Biodiversity Hotspot and protects threatened silver peppermint and grassy blue gum forests, rock plate grasslands and several species of threatened plants.

6. Brown Mountain Reserve Gifted 2007

This 86 ha reserve of wet swamp gum and stringy-bark forest near Ellendale includes a significant portion of old-growth forest. The property was purchased by the Brown Mountain Association in 1994 for permanent protection.

1. Bootlace Reserve

Revolved 2005

This 200 ha property protects endangered King Island eucalypt woodland, as well as supporting habitat for the rare bootlace bush and threatened woodland birds.

2. Cygnet Hills Reserve

Revolved 2005

This 20 ha property protects intact woodland and forest communities in a generally fragmented landscape, including old growth trees that provide critical habitat for hollow-nesting birds and mammals.

3. Dorothy Reeves Reserve (Rubicon Sanctuary) Revolved 2007

This 19 ha reserve of threatened black gum woodland, providing a habitat for the vulnerable burrowing crayfish and nine threatened plant species, including the critically endangered pretty leek orchid, which has only ever been found at this location.



4. Colliers Forest Reserve

Under contract for sale This 140 ha property protects threatened King Island eucalypt woodland and Melaleuca ericafolia swamp forest supports habitat for five rare plant species and three threatened woodland bird species.

5. Mayberry Reserve

For sale

This 26 ha property protects significant underground karst systems. The reserve extends the Marakoopa Cave State Reserve, which is a part of the Tasmanian World Heritage Area.

6. Liena Reserve

For sale

This 40 ha reserve supports under-reserved native forest and protects significant underground karst systems, including numerous sink holes and cave entrances. The reserve also adjoins the Great Western Tiers Conservation Area.

7. Snows Hill Reserve For sale

This 80 ha reserve supports vulnerable silver peppermint and black peppermint woodland communities and extends existing conservation areas. The reserve also supports habitat for threatened plant and animal species, as well as a suite of woodland birds. Revolving Fund Reserves 0607

These reserves have been protected in perpetuity by a conservation covenant and on-sold to conservationminded buyers.

Partnerships for Conservation 0607





During 2006-2007 the Tasmanian Land Conservancy continued to work alongside government and partner organisations to secure important conservation values on private land.

Protected Areas on Private Land Programme

The Tasmanian Land Conservancy continued an ongoing National Reserve System Programme project with the Department of Primary Industries and Water and the Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers Association to facilitate conservation covenants on private land.

During 2006-2007 TLC facilitated the completion of a further 4 covenants covering 109 ha bringing the total area protected by TLC in this programme to 2300 ha in 43 sites. TLC also continued actively working with private land owners for the development of a further 29 conservation covenants.

The programme was expanded to include a Tasmanian Midlands Landscape Conservation project which is partly funded by Bush Heritage Australia.

Mole Creek Karst Forest Programme

The Tasmanian Land Conservancy worked with the Forest Policy Section of Department Environment and Water Resources to develop and deliver a programme for the protection of forests in the Mole Creek area which protect significant karst cave systems.

During 2006-2007 two properties covering 66 ha were negotiated for purchase through this programme to be revolved. A further four properties are under negotiation for inclusion in the adjacent National Park.

The Tasmanian Land Conservancy is committed to ongoing management of its permanent reserves as well as supporting the management of reserves that have been revolved.

Reserve management activities in the 2006-2007 year included considerable input of time and expertise by enthusiastic volunteers and staff, as well as the development of comprehensive reserve management plans.

The Long Point Reserve woodlands restoration project was a strong focal point for 39 enthusiastic volunteers during the autumn and winter of 2007. This project saw more than 230 people/days volunteered to propagate and plant 5000 seedlings at the reserve and manually remove 4300m2 of gorse. This work, along with that of contractors, has seen the extent of gorse reduced by a further 20% since last year and over 40% since the acquisition of the reserve.

A team of Green Corp trainees spent 6 weeks at the Flat Rock Reserve, working to rehabilitate 3.4km of now-closed vehicle tracks, fence 300m of the reserve boundary, remove 70 bags of rubbish and clear 2000m2 of the invasive weed broom. A partnership between the TLC and the Southern Midlands Council has led to this reserve being managed collectively with the neighbouring Chauncy Vale Wildlife Sanctuary, and a Management Committee began developing a draft comprehensive Management Plan for the two reserves.

The spectacular Recherche Bay Reserve also saw the drafting of a comprehensive Management Plan, with support from a community-based reference group comprising stakeholders in the land and surrounding landscape. This reserve was also the subject of comprehensive vegetation mapping, which identified the presence of nearly 80 hectares of old growth forest.

Management of revolving fund properties under TLC ownership was continued, which included a cool regeneration burn at Dorothy Reeves Reserve designed to maintain habitat for critically endangered orchids.


